Autumn brings the start of a new year at Oak Grove School, and new programs for adults at the Krishnamurti Education Center. When reaching out to new students and their families we continue to ask ourselves these questions, and strive to craft narratives that reflect what we see on campus every day. This work is ongoing within our current community as well. A standing portion of our regular Parent Forum meeting is set aside to discuss **The Art of Living and Learning**, a framework for understanding the fabric of our school culture,

Oak Grove is a private school with a very public purpose, and therefore we address a third group: Those who want to positively affect our world and can contribute to Oak Grove's financial well-being. The school's mission is to help students develop the qualities of mind, heart, and body that will enable them to act with excellence, self-knowledge, and responsibility in the modern world. Oak Grove's unique community offers an environment of inquiry where whole, mindful, and intelligent approaches to life are investigated and perennial questions of humankind are explored. Students are encouraged within this climate of inquiry to question deeply what they

see and respond creatively and with a sense of personal integrity to whatever life may bring.

The attributes and outcomes described in Oak Grove's mission are made tangible through the students themselves – the inside story reflected in their actions and words particularly as they move out into the world as graduates. As we continue to hear back from our alumni, it is rewarding to see the enormous impact our students have upon their communities. As you will read in another article from Jodi Grass, Oak Grove's Director of Development, donors made it possible for 60 students to attend school this year who would otherwise not have been able to. The inside story is self-knowledge, harmony, compassion, beauty, engagement, and intelligence – qualities the world needs more than ever before.



A renewed focus on outreach is underway within our own community, the larger county and state, and internationally. This effort includes new ways of describing our mission through video, animation, imagery, narratives, and the Internet, as well as timeless vehicles such as hosting community gatherings on the campus and participating in local business and civic meetings. All of the early indications are very positive. In October, the school will launch a publication campaign framework centered on The Art of Living and Learning, with subsequent content published in newspapers, magazines, and website

In the classroom

The Art of Observation

The art of observation is a sub-set of the art of inquiry, one of six "arts" that provide a framework for learning at Oak Grove School. These arts are embedded in everything we do at the school. They connect across subject areas, grade levels, and extracurricular activities.

The art of observation manifests itself at different areas of the school in slightly different ways according to the developmental stage of the child/student.



For example, in early childhood, the art of observation might take the form of a conversation between teacher and child over an emotional conflict. The teacher might acknowledge the facts: "You look angry. You were holding the doll and she/he took it away from you." By this means the teacher is helping the child to consider the facts without judgment and move from this observation toward understanding.

In elementary school the art of observation might focus on developing an awareness of the five senses and using these to observe the natural world. Students take

nature walks and "notice" plants animals and other natural phenomena. They begin to ask questions, share and document their findings. Older students begin to discuss the scientific method and ask: how do we know what is true and what is assumed? They begin to dig deeper into what it means to directly observe what is happening and start to look at underlying



assumptions and how these may distort the truth. In literature or social studies teachers and students begin to look at how a person's cultural conditioning might lead to assumptions that distort reality and feed conflict.

Gradually, students become aware of the impact of direct observation on human relationships. For example, we encourage

in our communication protocol "checking the facts" before making assumptions and going to the "source" of a problem to determine the truth of a situation before emotionally reacting to a situation.

Krishnamurti often expressed that the highest form of intelligence was the ability to observe, just observe, and state the facts, without judging, without opinion.

Publications

Each year Krishnamurti Publications travels to the major bookfairs in the world of publishing, including the Beijing Bookfair, where interest in Krishnamurti's work is growing in leaps and bounds. This year, our Director of Publications, Derek Dodds, sent this story.

A priceless moment passed yesterday when a member of China's police force dropped by the Krishnamurti Publications booth at the Beijing Bookfair 2010 to peruse the quotes that we had translated into Chinese and scattered all over our booth walls.

Through my Chinese translator, a young volunteer who had attended the Krishnamurti Teacher's Training Academy in Ojai two years prior, I learned of the policeman's desire to break free of his own conditioning, and as he was showered by K's words a small part of him appeared to transform right in front of me.

He walked away from the booth 15 minutes later after we exchanged many thoughts and opinions about life and its deeper movements. He didn't go empty handed though; I gave him Krishnamurti's book *Freedom from the Known*, and a look of excited exploration came over his face as he silently read K's words while walking away. I had the feeling that my entire trip to China was of value in those moments, and the interaction gave me hope that our work at the Foundation was touching more lives than we could ever imagine.

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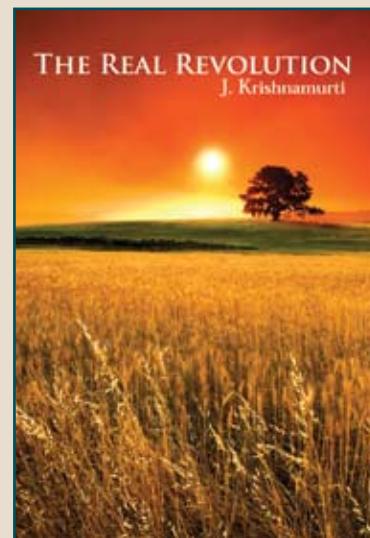

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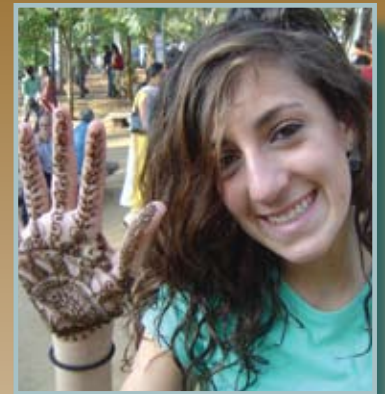
